Sportswriter Ray Didinger Turns Playwright

Philadelphia Eagles analyst and talk show host Ray Didinger is about to add a new act – literally -- to a storied career.

The Hall of Fame sportswriter and Village member has written a one-act play, *Tommy and Me*, about his boyhood hero, Eagles wide receiver Tommy McDonald, who helped lead the team to a national championship in 1960. The play, produced by Theatre Exile, opens a two-week run in August at the Fringe Arts Theatre on Columbus Boulevard.

"This is all about a boy and his hero," says Didinger, who used to visit Eagles training camp with his father—those days in Hershey— and carry McDonald's helmet -- unbeknownst at the time to McDonald.

Some 40 years later, Didinger helped lobby fellow sportswriters to elect McDonald to the Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.

While McDonald with 494 career catches and 84 touchdowns was headed in that direction, Didinger knew a strong advocate would help. So he made sure there was a loud cheering section with testimonials from legends like Don Shula, Chuck Bednarik, Tom Landry and others. When McDonald, in gratitude, selected Didinger to "present" him for induction, Didinger was overwhelmed and felt his boyhood worship requited.

"Life had come full cycle," he says.

Tommy and Me was picked for production following a successful reading at Plays and Players in Center City last May. Joe Canuso, the director, is the Founding Artistic Director of Theatre Exile and director of such stalwarts as *Who's Afraid* (continued on page 3)

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Philadelphia University and Rivage Site Top Zoning Agenda

Two projects, which will have major impact on East Falls, top the current agenda of the East Falls Community Council's Zoning Committee.

Philadelphia University's plan for a Special Institutional Zone would allow the University to construct eight new buildings identified in its plan with no further approval from the community.

A proposal by developer David Grasso envisions a 200-apartment riverfront building with ground-floor commercial space on the former Rivage Ballroom site, Ridge Ave. and Calumet St.

The Zoning Committee of the East Falls Community Council, chaired by Todd Baylson, has considered both proposals at public meetings. They will be the subject of further discussions.

The University responded to community concerns about its earlier 30-year plan. That plan called for a parking garage on Henry Ave. and more than 20 new buildings, including ones on the girls' softball field at Henry Ave. and School House Lane and on the Warden Drive "sledding hill."

The University returned to the community late in 2015 with a plan that eliminates the parking garage and the buildings on the softball field and sledding hill.

Some in the community see the plan as responsible and necessary for the University to remain successful. They point out that the City Zoning Code would restrict the University from any additional building beyond the plan without community consent, and they urge approval.

Others want the University to identify open spaces and commit to not build on them in perpetuity. They want the Zoning Committee to withhold approving the plan until the University agrees.

At press time, the Committee is waiting for a response to a series of questions and concerns it has submitted to the University.

David Grasso's proposal – on a longabandoned Kelly Drive parcel that serves as a dismal gateway to East Falls – provides 200 parking spaces and new traffic lanes on Ridge Ave and Calumet St. leading to the East Falls Bridge.

The Zoning Committee is awaiting final plans. Some in the community see the project as a creative, attractive addition to the East Falls riverfront. Others object to the number of apartment units, density and footprint of the proposed building and its height.

of Virginia Woolf and Glengarry Glen Ross. Tommy and Me takes the audience from the Eagle's training facility in Hershey to the induction ceremonies in Canton, from a boy's unspoken hero worship to his hero's gradual awakening to the one-sided relationship.

From sports writer, to talk show host, to

football analyst, to playwright, Didinger hardly needs another act in life. His achievements long ago earned him a spot in *Who's Who*. Since then the list has only grown:

- ▶ Football Hall of Fame, Writers' Honor Roll
- ▶ Six- time Emmy award winner as writer and producer with NFL Films
- Author of 11 books including three best sellers: *The New Eagles Encyclopedia, One Last Read,* and *The Ultimate Book of Sports Movies*
- ► Temple University's Communications Hall of Fame
- ► Five- time Pennsylvania Sports Writer of the Year
- ▶ Dick McCann Award for distinguished reporting on pro football

Tommy and Me speaks to Didinger's lifelong attachment to football which he calls a "great teacher of teamwork." The football-as-life metaphor captures the characterbuilding aspects of a sport under increasing scrutiny for its violent hits and head injuries. Youth football and Pop Warner participation are down 15 percent.

Didinger says the NFL and youth leagues are doing everything possible to improve equipment and rules to protect the head. Ironically, he says, the evolution of the helmet from the old leather kind to the high impact, padded, face mask version has increased a player's sense of invincibility. The NFL has responded by restricting hits with the head. "Human missiles are out," says Didinger. "It's a contact sport. We have to be smart about minimizing the risks."

Didinger is a host on 94WIP all-sports talk radio and appears on Comcast SportsNet TV as the primary analyst on Eagles Pre-Game and Post-Game Live. He and his wife, Maria Gallagher, former food and restaurant critic for *Philadelphia Magazine*, live on Midvale Avenue. The couple moved to East Falls in 1987 and joined the Village a year ago.

On My Own By Diane Rehm / review by John T. Gillespie

On My Own Diane Rehm



From the latest battlefront in the culture wars comes NPR radio host Diane Rehm's outspoken defense of assisted suicide.

Ever since her husband, John Rehm, starved himself to death in December 2015 following a long battle with Parkinson's, she has taken up the cause, now approved in six states, of the right to die. It was a choice denied her husband. "I rage at a system that would not allow John to be helped toward his own death," she writes in *On My Own*, a memoir about widowhood and tribute to John. "Why should it be that only a few states allow aid in dying with help from a trained physician willing to offer the ultimate gift?"

Her conviction stands in contrast to her doubts as she faces life alone – doubts about handling daily chores, cooking, paying the bills, sickness, when to retire, and myriad other decisions.

Rehm rejects the notion of redemptive human suffering. "The idea of suffering as being noble does not persuade me that extending life for the sake of someone else's religious beliefs or philosophy is fair or even reasonable. Let each of us make our own decisions."

At times this quick-read reminiscence (162 pages) slips into saccharine reflections on Rehm's marriage -- the seemingly endless idylls just walking, talking to, and appreciating each other; the deferential mention of her husband's many talents, including cooking; the wrenching night she moved to her husband's side of the bed after he entered a care facility and after more than 50 years of marriage.

But Rehm also pulls no punches describing the downsides of her marriage, her husband's "sometimes emotionally abusive" silent treatment for days on end for which he apologizes on his deathbed.

Proponents of assisted suicide will find in *On My Own* affirmation while opponents will find it an attack on life itself, which, they believe, must be protected from conception to natural death.
